"By the third week, I started to question my ability to grasp what was being taught and it began to feel like I was being taught a foreign language. I questioned whether I even belonged there" she says, "But something told me to keep going and keep trying. I spent my third weekend re-reading and re-taking all of my notes and materials and used Elevate's read-aloud feature to hear my notes back.
